

Loreto Portland

125 Years

Loreto Portland was founded in December 1884

After an illness in 1883 Mother Gonzaga Barry was persuaded to go to Portland to convalesce in the brisk sea air. She thought all the sisters would benefit from a seaside house and in December 1884 Mother Gonzaga travelled with a community of five to found Loreto Convent Portland and to begin Loreto's long association with Portland. A school was opened in the last week of January 1885.

A six room cottage in Bentinck Street was leased and Bayview Cottage eventually purchased. Bayview Cottage had been built by Stephen Henty and later rented by Mary MacKillop and her family.

Mother Boniface Volcker was appointed the first Superior and Mother Raphael Gallavan, Mistress of Schools.

Later Seaview Cottage next door was purchased which was to become the boys' college, St. Aloysius in 1906. In 1900 the front of the Convent was built and in 1903 the wing with the spire was added.

In 1885 Loreto also took responsibility for All Saints School, the Parish Primary School.

Portland's Dolls' House, an eight room two storey house with furnished rooms, laundry and kitchen. Each child was given a room to look after. The doll's house was housed in one of the front rooms named "The Doll's House".



Mother Angela Finn was born in Portland in 1902. Her mother was a friend of Mary MacKillop's mother and she received her first communion from Father Tenison Woods, co-founder with Mary Mackillop of the Sisters of Joseph.

Lack of available religious staff, the high proportion of non-Catholic enrolments and lack of opportunity for boys' education in Portland prompted the restructuring of Loreto Portland.

In 1977 Loreto Portland became a co-educational, ecumenical Christian school, the Christian Community College, which became Bayview College in 1996.
